Blair is beginning her second term on the school board. During her first three years she served on the employee retirement/recognition dinner committee, administrative negotiations, and transportation committee.

Blair, who has lived on a ranch north of Sturgis for the past 30 years, is a seamstress, humorist and homemaker. She is a member of the Sturgis Community Health Care Center Advisory Board, and District 5 State Farm Bureau Board. She is an active member of the First Presbyterian Church and has been a 4-H leader for more than 25 years. She has served as secretary for the Meade County Fair for 16 years, and also a volunteer with the Western Jr. 4-H Livestock Show.

Of concern to her is keeping the district fiscally responsible, increasing student enrollment, and making the educational environment a better place

in which the students can learn. Blair and her husband Edward have two children.

Chowen, who is also beginning his second three-year term on the board, has served on the support staff negotiations committee, administrative salary committee, transportation committee and employee recognition committee.

The retired Army officer and former educator has lived in Sturgis since 2000, but is a native of Vale. He feels the most important issue facing the district is declining enrollment because fewer students means less money for the district.

Chowen is an elder in the Presbyterian Church, and a member of the American Legion, Veterans Club, Northern Hills Bird Club, and Stone Masons. He and his wife Roxie have three grown children.

As the newest member of the

board, Behrens said there are a number of issues impacting the district such as the No Child Left Behind Act, the facility master plan, and communications, but before offering any opinions she wants to research them further.

Behrens was a teacher and administrator for 33 years, 15 of those with the Meade District. The Sturgis resident is a 28-year member of Delta Kappa Gamma which is an honorary educational organization, and member of SD Business and Office Educators. Her community involvement includes membership in First United Methodist Church, PEO, Fort Meade Museum, and Sturgis Area Chamber of Commerce.

She is a former board member of the Sturgis Area United Way where she served as co-chairman of Day of Caring. She and her husband Bob have three adult children.

dents, together with their parents, will have an opportunity to meet homeroom teachers.

### **Piedmont and Stagebarn Grades K-6**

Registration for new students will be 8 a.m.-3 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 18-19, at the Stagebarn School. Students who were enrolled at those schools last year do not have to re-enroll.

However, if there are changes in addresses, phone numbers, etc., those changes may be made at this time. Food Service personnel will be present to sell meal tickets during these two days.

There will be an open house from 2:30-4:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 26, at both the Piedmont and Stagebarn schools. Class lists will be posted on the front door of each school.

A mandatory meeting for parents

# Summer is a busy time for teachers

School may be out for students, but many of the Meade School District teachers return to the classroom each summer as students themselves.

Summer workshops and classes organized by the district total more than two dozen and include reading and writing workshops; teaching vocabulary to elementary and secondary students; cognitive guided instruction; basic and advanced web page design; life skills training; achieving improvement in math and

science; effective teacher and class management; professional development in math for high school teachers: statistics and probability, geometry and South Dakota math standards; and CPR recertification.

"In this day and age we are told that the level of human knowledge doubles every five years," said James Heinert, Meade 46-1 School District superintendent.

"Therefore it is critically important that teachers keep their knowledge and skills current, so they, in turn, can provide the best instruction possible to their students," he said. "As a district, we have been fortunate to receive many grants and other opportunities to provide our staff with high quality training in the latest scientifically based research regarding effective practices in the classroom," he said.

Apart from the programs sponsored and organized by the district, there are classes and training offered by universities and other entities which Meade staff participate.

Educators have to accumulate six hours of college credit each five years to keep their teaching certificate. Each hour of college credit requires at least 15 hours of actual time.

## Substitute teacher training is set for Sept. 3

A training for persons wishing to serve as substitute teachers in the Meade 46-1 School District will be held at 10 a.m. Friday, Sept. 3, in the north building of Williams Middle School, 1230 Douglas Street, Sturgis.

The purpose of the session is to review the district's *Handbook for Substitute Teachers* and to answer questions about local procedures and policies.

District policy states that "all persons employed as substitute teach-

ers in the Meade School District participate in a conference with one of the district principals or their designee for the purpose of reviewing the *Handbook for Substitute Teachers*."

Previously approved substitute teachers need not attend, however any one having questions or suggestions is welcome.

Persons holding a high school diploma, GED, college degree or South Dakota teacher's certificate are eligible to substitute. A current

physical exam certificate and background fingerprint check is also required.

Substitutes are used in all the schools of the Meade District which includes Sturgis, Piedmont, Stagebarn, Whitewood, and the rural schools of Alkali, Atall, Elm Springs, Enning, Hereford, Opal, Sulphur Creek, and Union Center.

# Dschaak is new assistant principal



# Activity tickets now available for purchase

# Inservice heralds school year beginning

The fall staff inservice, or fall professional development as it is now called, which heralds the beginning of the new school year, will be held Wednesday through Friday, Aug. 25-27.

The first day kickoff at the Sturgis Community Center with a staff wellness screening from 6:30-7:30 a.m. Refreshments will be available and exhibits set up from 7:15 a.m. until the grand opening at 8 a.m. Opening ceremonies include the presentation of the colors by the Marine Corps JROTC, Pledge of Allegiance and National Anthem.

The opening ceremonies will be followed by greetings from Sturgis Mayor Mark Zeigler, Meade Education Association representative Carol Halter, Meade School Board President Terry Koontz, and United Way Executive Director Renee Parker. Personnel new to the district will be introduced after which Superintendent James Heinert will speak. Following Heinert's address, each administrator will meet with his or her own staff.

A lunch break is planned from 11:45 a.m.-1 p.m. and then staff meetings will be held until 4:30 p.m.

A mandatory meeting for parents of students participating in fall activities will be held that evening at 5:30 in the east gym, Sturgis Brown High School, followed at 6:30 p.m. by the ninth grade and new student orientation in the west gym.

For staff not already trained in Boys Town classroom model, training will be offered from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. Thursday and Friday, Aug. 26-27, in rooms 102 and 103 of Sturgis Williams Middle School. For staff already trained in the Boys Town model, the second day of in-service opens at 8:30 a.m. with a keynote

address entitled "A Plan for Success" by John Mooy. The location of this keynote talk is the Spearfish High School Auditorium. The remainder of the day consists of administrative site-based planning, classroom preparation, open houses and new student registration.

All activities of the final day of

fall professional development takes place at Sturgis Williams Middle School and includes departmental meetings and various breakout sessions covering such topics as test taking, increasing math achievement, reading strategies, and working with students with behavioral needs.

## Boys Town training ongoing

For the past year, Meade District staff have been receiving instruction and training in the Boys Town Education Model "The Well-Managed Classroom" where participants learn interactions for promoting positive behavior change in the classroom.

Two days of this training are also being offered teachers during the fall staff inservice. An abbreviated version is also being presented to district bus drivers, lunchroom and playground aids, custodians and paraprofessionals.

The purpose of the training is for

all staff to become more effective in the school setting through the implementation of various discipline procedures and practices.

Once all staff have been trained, Boys Town consultants will observe and help staff apply and adapt what they have learned. Sometime in December the district's implementation of the Education Model will be evaluated through further consultations and assessments as a way of providing an objective measure of the changes that have occurred in the district since the program's implementation.

## Life saving equipment in place in two Meade District gyms

Two automatic external defibrillators are now in place in the Meade School District - at Grunwald Auditorium and the west gym of Sturgis Brown High School.

More than a year ago, representatives of the Sturgis Hospital Advisory Board approached the school board for support of its campaign to purchase the defibrillators for placement in the gyms, and at the Sturgis Community Center.

The defibrillators are available for use in emergency situations by

those trained in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and automatic external defibrillators. Meade staff so trained include all the coaches, students enrolled in Twyla Barden's lifesaving classes and Darla DeKraai's child development classes, and most of the special education teachers.

According to school nurse Randi Oviatt, she and her staff offer CPR and AED at all staff in-services. "Our goal," she said, "is to have as many staff trained as possible."

# Free and reduced priced meals are available to Meade school students

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown on the chart on the next page may be eligible for free or reduced price meals - both breakfast and lunch - with the Meade School District.

Households that are currently on food stamps or Temporary Assistance to Needy Families will receive letters indicating that their children

are eligible for free school meals. These families should not complete an application for free meals but rather should take that letter or a copy of the letter to the school food service office located in the Primary School at Third and Howard Streets, Sturgis.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for free or reduced price meals regardless of the income of the household in which they reside. Households with a foster child should contact the school for more information on how to apply for the benefits.

To apply for free or reduced price breakfast and lunch, households of all other enrolled students should fill out the application and return it to the school. The informa-

tion provided on the application is confidential and will only be used for the purpose of determining eligibility status for school meals and Title I programs.

If a household that receives food stamps, TANF, or FDPIR (commodities) does not receive the letter from Social Services or the Interagency Notice of Action or chooses not to bring it to school, the household should complete an application.

Households that receive free or reduced price meals for children are required to report to the school increases in household income of more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year and/or any decreases in household size, or if a child's or the

## Meal tickets go on sale

Breakfast and lunch tickets are available through the Meade School District Food Service office located in the Primary School Building, Sturgis, from 8 a.m.-3 p.m. beginning Monday, Aug. 16. Applications for meal assistance and tickets will also be available during registration at all schools. Ticket prices are as follows:

### Milk Tickets

20 milk ticket: \$5

### Breakfast Tickets

20 meal ticket: K-12, \$18; adult, \$23

10 meal ticket: K-12, \$9; adult, \$11.50

5 meal ticket: K-12, \$4.50; adult, \$5.75

### Lunch Tickets

(Includes ½ pint milk)

20 meal ticket: K-12, \$45; adult, \$55

10 meal ticket: K-12, \$22.50; adult, \$27.50

5 meal ticket: K-12, \$11.25; adult, \$13.75

Single meals are also available for purchase. The cost of a single breakfast meal is 90 cents for students kindergarten through senior in high school, and \$1.15 for adults. A single lunch meal costs \$2.25 for students and \$2.75 for adults. A half-pint of milk can be purchased for 25 cents.

## Food service changes planned

Research shows that one of the keys to academic success is good nutrition, something the Meade Food Service strives to offer those attending school in the Meade District.

But trying to keep up with current food trends while also providing nutritious and tasty meals is a challenge. Just ask Meade Food Service Director Joe Schaffer.

But Schaffer and his 26 employees are meeting that challenge head-on by instituting several changes, primarily in the delivery of the food.

The first change concerns the eating location for the Sturgis Williams Middle School fifth and sixth grade students. Instead of lunch on the stage of the gym, the students will eat at the cafeteria in the south building of SWMS - just a

short distance from the building that houses them. "This move will not only allow us to better prepare and serve the food, but the new location offers an improved atmosphere," said Schaffer.

The second change is taking place at the high school where the kitchen is being remodeled.

The five-foot serving window has been enlarged to 14-feet and several walls have been removed to expand the kitchen - both changes will speed up serving, thereby improving food quality.


The kitchen expansion, according to Schaffer, gives his staff more preparation area and also allows space for a dishwasher. Previously, any washing of dishes was done by hand. With the addition of a dish-

# Counselors and social worker join Meade staff

The Meade School District has always been in the forefront of providing guidance and counseling to its students. Long before mandates, the Meade District had licensed staff in place to help students of all ages - elementary through high school - including those considered to be at risk and those with special needs.

New to the district this school year are Kristi Ortiz, counselor at Sturgis Elementary, and Ginger Johnson, social worker. Ortiz takes the place of Lori Draper who is on leave of absence, while Johnson replaces Al Lloyd. Lloyd, now a

counselor at Sturgis Williams Middle School, replaces Eldon Clifford who has returned to college.

For the past five years Ortiz was the K-6 school counselor and K-12 gifted education coordinator for the Hill City School District. Johnson has been with the Department of Social Services child protection division for 18 years, the last five as supervisor for Sturgis, Belle Fourche and Deadwood. Lloyd begins his eighth year with the Meade School District.

washer, the use of Styrofoam on which to serve the food is a thing of the past. "We used to pay \$16 a day for Styrofoam," said Schaffer. "That savings will now go toward the purchase of plastic trays."

Several more a la carte items have been added to the high school menu including Scooper Sam's hotwing nuggets. All too often when

the students eat is determined by what is being served, so Schaffer is hoping the expanded menu will help to increase participation.

Another change taking place this coming school year concerns the operation of the concessions. In the past, a school staff member received extra-duty pay to take charge of the concessions, but now that will be the

responsibility of food service.

Only two other South Dakota school districts have their concessions run by food service, but that doesn't deter Schaffer. "This will certainly be something new for us, but we are ready for it," he said. One immediate change will be longer hours of operation for the concession stands.

household's Temporary Assistance to Needy Families, food stamp, or commodity benefits are rescinded.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. If a parent or guardian becomes unemployed, the children from that household may be eligible for free or reduced price meals during the time of unemployment if the household's income falls within the income eligibility guidelines.

# Attendance policy undergoes changes

As a result of changes last semester to the school district's attendance policy, students are now expected to treat school as preparation for future life.

Under the revised policy, habits of regular attendance are en-

couraged and rewarded while tardiness and absenteeism are subject to disciplinary action.

Excessive absenteeism, pursuant to the policy, is defined as exceeding 10 days per semester for any reason. Quoting from the policy,

"A student's contribution and achievement in class are directly related to attendance...students miss a vital portion of their education when they are absent from class."

The policy changes were driven by the fact that improved attendance is one of the district's school improvement goals. "In attempting to address this goal we determined that it would be helpful to make some changes in our attendance policy," explained Superintendent James Heinert.

Last year the Meade District attendance rate was 94.6 percent, and it is the school board's goal to reach a 96 percent rate. The statewide attendance rate for 2002-2003, the most recent figures available, was 95.6 percent.

## Attendance in 1916

The more things change the more they remain the same. From the March 31, 1916, minutes of the Board of Education of the Independent School District of the City of Sturgis:

"Prof. Wagner spoke of the absence from school of some of the students in the graduating class and that they were out so much that they could not keep up their grades to the standard that they ought to have them and that they were getting further behind all of the while.

"A motion was moved and carried that the Superintendent notify the parents of these students with a written notice that the Board would insist upon their children attending more regular or they would be denied graduation upon the grounds of poor attendance."

# Library, tennis requests now in the budget

The recently approved Meade School District capital outlay budget of \$1,762,606 for 2004-05 includes funding for library construction and tennis court construction, both projects of the city of Sturgis.

The school board OK'd the district's participation in the library project at a level of \$25,000 per year for the next two years, for a total contribution of \$50,000. This allocation is contingent upon the city waiving the library user fee for all residents of the Meade 46-1 School District.

The school will also give \$20,000 to the city to help fund the construction of new tennis courts. The courts will be built on city property and owned by the city. The city will also be responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of the courts.


The school has not made any previous capital or facility investments in support of the tennis program. In fact, the school has been allowed free access by the city to the tennis courts since tennis became a school sanctioned co-curricular activity in 1991.

In addition to the capital outlay budget, the school board also approved a general fund budget of \$13,946,965, and a special education budget of \$2,222,009.
